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# **INTIMACY WITH GOD**

How would you describe your relationship with God? Do you have an "intimate" relationship with Him? This is God's goal for your prayer life. He longs to establish an intimate relationship with you.

Because of His love, He has saved you through His Son, Jesus Christ. He has opened the door to His presence. He desires that you get alone and get with Him. He wants you to know Him. He longs to work in every area of your heart and life. He desires to cultivate a unique personal relationship with you—a relationship like no other in your life.

God longs for you to pursue an intimate relationship with Him. This is perhaps the hardest lesson that I've had to learn. For most of my walk with God, I judged my relationship with Him by what I did for Him. I call this the "activity" trap. The more I did for God, the closer I thought I was to God. You know, if my schedule was filled with activities for the Lord, it must mean that I am pleasing Him. Yet, He desires intimacy before activity. He is concerned first about what I am before Him and what I do for Him second. Activity has never been and never will be an acceptable substitute for intimacy with God.

God began changing me concerning this as I read **Revelation 2** one night. I was preparing a series of messages on the seven churches. As I was reading about the church of Ephesus, God convicted me in a way that I can't describe with words. Jesus listed all the amazing activities of the church at Ephesus (2:1-3). Then Jesus declares this stunning indictment, "Nevertheless I have this against you, that you have left your first love" (**Revelation 2:4**). As I read that text, it felt as if a knife went through my heart. I had to put my Bible down and get on my knees. All I could do is weep and say, "Lord, that's me. Lord, that's me." That night God began the process of teaching me the necessity of intimacy with Him.

**ISSUE 4** 

This issue of *The Prayer Closet* will focus on intimacy with God. It is about cultivating this with God through prayer life. We will be looking at what it means to develop intimacy with God and practical steps on how to cultivate it in your relationship with Him. I do not write this as an expert. I still struggle with this issue. I'm just one struggler attempting to encourage and help you with the insights that God has given me through this struggle.

# What Is Intimacy With God?

Intimacy with God has two basic aspects. On the one hand, it is growing in your knowledge and experience of God. On the other hand, it is you yielding more and more of yourself to Him so that He can change you and heal you. Intimacy consists of you getting to know God in a deeper way and surrendering God so that He can do His work in your life.

These two aspects work off of each other. The more you grow in your understanding and experience of Him, the more you will surrender to Him and receive His powerful working in your

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life. The deeper He works in your life, the greater your desire to know Him and His ways.

God desires that you grow in your understanding of who He is and His ways. He longs for you to pursue a growing knowledge of His character and purposes. At a conference, I was sharing with a young lady the necessity of deepening her understanding of God through the Word and prayer. As I was sharing this with her, she stopped me and said, "Jesus loves me, this I know, for the Bible tells me so. This is all that I really need to know." It is wonderful to know that God is love. It is one of His many characteristics. Yet, there is so much more to God than this. He is the great and mighty God! He yearns for you to grow in your understanding of Him and His ways. He desires that you experience Him in deeper and varied ways.

At the same time, God wants to change you. You need to grow in your understanding of God. However, God does not need to grow in His understanding of you; He knows you intimately and perfectly. Yet, what God desires is to change every area of your life. God knows what needs to be transformed in your life. He longs to show you what must be surrendered, what needs to be healed, and what needs to be repented of and cleaned out. He wants you to surrender to Him so that you can experience His loving and merciful transformation. God wants to shape and mold you according to His good and gracious plan for your life.

A good way of understanding intimacy is to compare it to access. When you trusted in Jesus Christ, you received access into the presence of God. Jesus Christ provided you the opportunity to enter God's presence, "For through Him we both have access by one Spirit to the Father" (Ephesians 2:18). Because of Jesus, you can have the confidence that God receives you, hears you, and answers you, "In whom we have boldness and access with confidence through faith in Him" (Ephesians 3:12). The opportunity enter God's presence and to talk with Him is your privilege and right as a child of God, "Therefore, brethren, having boldness to enter the Holiest by the blood of Jesus, by a new and living way which He consecrated for us, through the veil, that is, His flesh" (Hebrews 10:19-20).

Every believer has access into God's presence. Yet, not every believer experiences intimacy with God. Access is the open door into God's presence. Intimacy is taking advantage of this access or the open door to God's presence. It is entering God's presence, spending quality time with Him. Intimacy is to follow access. The privilege of prayer should lead the pursuit of intimacy with God.

As a believer, you are provided with the opportunity to know and experience God. Intimacy is taking advantage of this opportunity.

# Why Should I Pursue Intimacy With God?

As a believer, you have access to God. Now that you have access, you should pursue intimacy with Him. The Bible offers numerous motivations for pursuing this intimacy. First. salvation involves intimacy with God. Jesus declares in John 17:3, "And this is eternal life, that they may know You, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom You have sent." Jesus connects eternal life with knowing God and Himself. The word "know" in the text refers to more than an intellectual understanding of who God is. It refers to an intimate knowledge of God and His Son, Jesus. It is the personal encounter with God and the experience of Him in daily life. Jesus describes eternal life as a growing, intimate relationship with God. Salvation is not just for the forgiveness of sins. It is not just securing you a place in heaven. It is not just escaping eternal These are the results of damnation in hell. salvation. Salvation is entering into a personal relationship with God through faith in Jesus and repentance of sin. This relationship is to grow and mature as you walk with God. You were saved for the purpose of relationship. Your salvation is for the purpose of knowing and growing in the knowledge of your God. This should stir you to pursue intimacy with the God who has saved you.

Next, you should pursue intimacy with God because of the analogy of a father and child. God has revealed Himself to us in a variety of ways. Yet, what a glorious revelation that God is our Father! The Word of God declares that God is the Father of all who trust in Jesus, "For you are all

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sons of God through faith in Christ Jesus" (Galatians 3:26). God is your Father. He longs to have the most intimate relationship of any that you could ever have. He has revealed Himself as a loving Father in order to teach you this. He has shown you that you are His child because He yearns for you to trust Him, love Him, and depend on Him as a child would. The analogy of a father and child as a picture of your relationship to God speaks volumes. Through this analogy, He is calling you to intimacy. Intimacy is the Father's calling for your life.

Third, Jesus commands believers to get alone and get with your Father. In Matthew 6, Jesus reveals the Father's desire, "But you, when you pray, go into your room, and when you have shut the door, pray to your Father who is in the secret place; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you openly" (Matthew 6:6). Jesus is teaching that the Father wants you to get alone with Him, "go into your room, and when you have shut the door." He also wants you to focus on Him and spend time with Him, "pray to your Father who is in secret." It is the Father's will that you spend quality time with Him. This is His passionate desire. This command reveals your Father's heart: He longs to cultivate an intimate relationship with You. He yearns to have a relationship with You that can compare to no other in your life. Matthew 6:6 is the Father's invitation to intimacy.

Your Father's desire to change you should motivate you to pursue intimacy. God loves you. He wants to change your life. He desires to mold you and shape you according to His purpose. This is His continual work in your life, "Being confident of this very thing, that He who has begun a good work in you will complete it until the day of Jesus Christ" (Philippians 1:6). God's work of changing you takes place as you spend time with Him. When you pray and dig into His Word, God will unleash His purpose and power in your life. You cannot experience real change in your life if you are not pursuing intimacy with As you seek Him, He touches you and God. transforms your life.

The final motivation for seeking intimacy is God's care for you. God cares for you. He wants you to share your life with Him, including your cares and burdens. Listen to the heart of God, "Casting all your care upon Him, for He cares for you" (1 Peter 5:7). Casting all your care on Him means committing your burdens and cares to Him. It is rolling them off of your shoulders into His mighty hand. This calls for intimacy. You will not be able to commit your problems to the Lord if you are not growing in intimacy with God. You will struggle to pour your heart out to the Lord if you are not spending consistent, quality time with Your Father. God's care for you should fill your heart with desire to pursue intimacy with Him.

## The Enemies of Intimacy

In order to deepen your relationship, you will face a variety of enemies to intimacy. These enemies are overwhelming obstacles to a genuine, maturing relationship to God. These enemies are:

#### **Enemy #1: Hypocrisy**

In Matthew 6, Jesus warns us against this enemy of intimacy, "And when you pray, you shall not be like the hypocrites. For they love to pray standing in the synagogues and on the corners of the street, that they may be seen by men. Assuredly, I say to you, they have their reward" (Matthew 6:5). The Pharisees prayed for a show. They did not pray from a sincere heart. They were not truly seeking God. There was no intimacy with God. This hypocrisy can invade your prayer life. It happens when you are not honest and authentic with God. You pray but it is not from the heart. You talk with God, but you do not share your heart with Him. You enter and leave His presence without committing your true feelings and concerns to Him. This will prevent you from having the kind of intimacy that God wants to share with you.

#### **Enemy #2: Shallowness**

Jesus also warns us about this enemy of intimacy by saying, "And when you pray, do not use vain repetitions as the heathen do. For they think that they will be heard for their many words" (Matthew 6:7). Shallow praying never leads to intimacy. Shallow praying is simply going through the motions of prayer. It is using the same old clichés and trite sayings and calling it prayer. The Father desires that you speak to Him from the heart. He wants to have a conversation with you. He is not interested in you repeating the same phrases and sentences that you always have. Intimacy with God requires putting away clichés and trite sayings and speaking honestly and thoughtfully with God.

#### **Enemy #3: Lack of Repentance**

An unwillingness to deal with sin hampers a believer from experiencing intimacy with God, "If I regard iniquity in my heart, the LORD will not hear" (**Psalm 66:18**). God is holy; He hates sin. If you are going to pursue intimacy, then you must be willing to deal with sin. This includes confessing sin and rooting sinful habits out of your life. If you are not diligent to do these things, it will hinder you from developing a vital and rich relationship to God.

#### Enemy # 4: Low Self-Esteem

Some believers do not feel worthy of a deep and intimate relationship. They do not feel that God can love them and desire this kind of relationship with them. Their feelings of unworthiness limit their relationship to God. It has to be remembered that the righteousness of Jesus makes us worthy to be in a relationship with God. We are not in a right relationship with God because of who we are or what we have done. We are in a right relationship with God and have access into His presence because we are clothed in the righteousness of Jesus, "Knowing that a man is not justified by the works of the law but by faith in Jesus Christ . . . for by the works of the law no flesh shall be justified" (Galatians 2:16).

#### Enemy #5: Unhealthy Dependence on Others

Intimacy with God is hindered when a believer depends on others more than on God. God longs to be the One to whom you run, "The name of the LORD is a strong tower; the righteous run to it and are safe" (**Proverbs 18:10**). God desires that you turn to Him before you turn to others. He longs to be the One you cry out to in all the circumstances of your life. When you depend more on others than on God, it will hold you back from experiencing a deeper relationship with God. It can limit your experience of God's faithfulness and love.

### **Enemy #6: Complacency**

If you are not willing to work at your relationship with God, you will not experience intimacy with Him. In a relationship, you have to work at the There must be diligence and relationship. commitment to the other person. You must spend time with the other person. There has to be a sharing of your hearts and lives. The same is true in your relationship with God. If your relationship with Him is going to grow and mature, you must commit yourself to seeking Him. There has to be a willingness on your part to open yourself to God and share your heart and life with Him, "Behold, I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in to him and dine with him, and he with Me" (Revelation 3:20).

# Practical Steps For Pursuing Intimacy With God

In this section, I would like to offer some practical steps that you can take to pursue greater intimacy with God. These are suggestions that you can use to help you cultivate your relationship, with God. As you read through these, ask the Holy Spirit to guide you in the steps that you need to take for your relationship with God. He may guide you to use these or He may help you develop steps from these. The key issue is to take practical steps to prepare yourself to for greater intimacy with God.

Express your desire to God. Share with God your passionate desire to know Him more intimately. Declare your longing for Him to work in your life in a deeper more powerful way. Plead Psalm 42:1-2, Psalm 63:1, and Psalm 84:2, asking Him to grant you greater intimacy with Him. Use these verses to express your longing for Him and His work in your life.

Pray that God will reveal Himself to you in fresh and new ways. Ask God to increase your understanding of His character and His ways. Plead with Him to teach you about Himself and His will. Claim the promise of Hebrews 8:10-12. Ask that you will be delivered from the sin of the ignorance of God and His ways (Hosea 4:1).

- Saturate your life with the Word of God. God has revealed Himself and His ways in the Word of God. The Word is His primary tool for teaching you about Himself and His ways. Fill your life with the Word of God by hearing, reading, studying, meditating on, and memorizing the Scripture.
- Study the character of God. You might consider doing a study of God's characteristics. Most study Bibles will have a discussion of these along with Scriptures for these. You might use a concordance or a topical Bible. Search what the Scripture says about His character. Pray that the Spirit will guide you in the truth.
- Strive to be honest with God. Share with God what is on your heart. Tell Him what you are feeling. I'm not encouraging you to be irreverent toward God. But, I am encouraging you to be honest before Him. Do not hold anything back from Him. Relate to Him the good, the bad, and the ugly! In order to help you strive for honesty before God, you might want to consider incorporating the following type of statements in your praying:

By using these types of statements, it can aid you in sharing what is really on your heart rather than going through the motions of prayer without the heart.

Open your life to God. Ask God to search you and to deal with You as He pleases. Pray Psalm 139:23-24, pleading with Him to convict you, touch you, and change you in all the areas of your life. Declare to Him that no

area in your life is closed to Him. Share with Him your willingness to be changed in whatever way He desires. Some of the areas that you can ask Him to search and deal with you about are:

- (1) Areas of your life that you have not surrendered to Him;
- (2) Sins that you have not forsaken;
- (3) Attitudes that have gone unchecked;
- (4) Feelings that are out of control;
- (5) The beliefs that are hindering your walk with Him;
- (6) Emotional wounds that you have kept open.

These are some of the areas that you must open to Him. The crucial issue is to open yourself to Him, pleading with Him to do what He pleases in your life.

□ Understand the difference between low-self esteem and humility. Many believers are hindered from experiencing intimacy with God because of feelings of unworthiness and inadequacy. God wants you to be humble; He does not want you to feel as if you have no value or that you are worthless. What are the differences between humility and low selfesteem?

Humility focuses on God; low self-esteem is focusing on yourself.

Humility flows out of comparing yourself with God and His standard; low self-esteem flows out of comparing yourself to others or to some standard that you or somebody else has imposed on you.

Humility causes you to see yourself as a sinner and in need of God; low self-esteem makes you see yourself as worthless and without any hope.

Humility leads you to depend on God; low self-esteem leads you to despair and self-hatred.

Humility creates in you the conviction that God will help you; low self-esteem will create within you the conviction that you are beyond help or hope.

Humility leads you to God who is Your only refuge and hope; low self-esteem leads you to yourself and your unworthiness. Plead with God to create humility in you. Ask Him to deal with any low self-esteem in your life. Pray that He will remove your feelings of worthlessness.

- □ Ask yourself some tough questions. Ask yourself about whom you love the most. Examine who you turn to in the circumstances of life. Is it God or is it others? Who are you placing your trust in on a daily basis? Call on the Holy Spirit to reveal the truth to you in clear and plain way. As He deals with you, honestly confess to Him anything or anybody that you have loved or trusted more than Him. Ask Him to enable you to love God with all your being. Plead with Him to enable you to put your confidence in God on a daily basis.
- □ Talk with God about everything. Intimacy with God is a holy friendship with Him. Talk with God throughout your day and night. Continually speak with Him about all that you hear, see, experience, and feel throughout the day. God is always present; therefore you can speak to Him at any time for any reason. Use this privilege to grow in your intimacy with Him. Talk with God, laugh with Him, weep with Him, sing to Him, complain to Him, rejoice with Him-share anything and everything with Him. This is exactly what God wants you to do, "Pray without ceasing" (1 Thessalonians 5:17). As you talk with Him about anything and everything, your intimacy with Him will grow.
- □ Ask God to reveal any hindrances to intimacy. You might consider asking God to show you anything that is hindering your intimacy with Him. Pray for the Holy Spirit to search you and show you anything that is blocking you from moving into a deeper, more intimate relationship with God.
- □ Have a daily appointment with God. Jesus teaches the necessity of this in Matthew 6:6. Commit yourself to spending time with God on a daily basis. It is best to have a set time that you will meet with Him in a particular place. Your "prayer closet" can be anywhere you spend time alone with Him. Have a daily appointment with Him; seek to be faithful to this appointment with your heavenly Father.

You will not grow in intimacy with God if you are not spending time with Him daily.

- □ Fill your life with praise and thanksgiving. When you praise and thank God, it focuses you on Him. It increases your trust in Him. It shows you how great and good He is. His power is released into your life through praise and giving of thanks (**Psalm 22:3**). These things will help you cultivate a deeper, richer relationship to your Father.
- Pray for a broken, surrendered will. You do not enter into greater intimacy with God apart from surrender. It is yielding yourself more and more to Him and His ways. It is coming to the end of yourself so that you can experience Him and His will. It is painful to pray this, but it is utterly essential to a deeper relationship with God. Surrender is the pathway to intimacy with God.

# Praying Psalm 139 For Intimacy With God

**Psalm 139** is the psalm of intimacy. It reveals God's knowledge of you. It also speaks of how you can move toward knowing and experiencing Him in richer ways. For this reason, you can pray this psalm in order to deepen your relationship to God.

The following is a model that you can use to pray this psalm. It is a guide to helping you pursue intimacy with God. You can adapt to meet your particular needs and situation. I suggest doing it over five weeks. You can do it in five days. Yet, it is best to take time reading, meditating on, and praying this psalm.

#### Week 1: Psalm 139:1-4

Each day this week, read and meditate on these four verses. Ask God to speak to you concerning these verses. Read and meditate also on the following Scripture: Exodus 3:7, 1 Kings 8:39, 2 Chronicles 16:9; Psalm 94:11, 147:5; Proverbs 15:3; Jeremiah 10:7, Acts 15:8. As He speaks to you, record the insights He gives you. Throughout this week:

Praise Him for His complete knowledge of you;

Confess that God knows everything about you; Plead that you will know Him as He knows you.



Week 2: Psalm 139:5-12

Each day this week, read and meditate on these verses. Ask Him to speak through these verses to your particular needs and situation. Read and meditate on the following Scripture passages: Genesis 16:13; Deuteronomy 2:7, 4:7; Psalm 46:1, 145:18; Jeremiah 23:23; Hebrews 4:13. Record the insights that God gives you concerning these verses. Throughout this week:

**Praise** God for always being present; **Confess** that nothing escapes the holy gaze of your Father; **Pray** that you will remember that God sees your every thought, feeling, word, and deed.



#### Week 3: Psalm 139:13-16

Read and meditate on these verses throughout the week. At the same time, read and meditate on Psalm 8:4-5; Proverbs 22:2; Isaiah 64:8, Małachi 2:10. Record the insights that God gives you from these verses. Throughout this week: Praise God for being your Creator and Sustainer; Confess daily that you are His unique and special creation; Ask God to deal with any feelings of worthlessness and shame in your life.



#### Week 4: Psalm 139:17-18

As you read and meditate on these verses this week, do the same with **Psalm 138:8** and **Jeremiah 29:11-13**. Throughout this week:

**Praise** God for loving you and having a good and righteous plan for your life; **Confess** that God has a wonderful plan for your life—a plan that is good and righteous; **Pray** that you will see and understand that God is at work in your life on a daily basis.



#### Week 5: Psalm 139:19-24

Ask God to speak to you through these verses along with John 16:7-11. Throughout this week: *Praise* God the Holy Spirit's work in your life; **Confess** that only the Holy Spirit can enable you to deal with sin and grow spiritually; Ask the Holy Spirit to reveal anything that is hindering your relationship to God. **Declare** your willingness to receive whatever He desires to show you.

### **Running To Your Refuge**

Your Father longs for you to trust Him. He wants you to have confidence in Him in all the circumstances of your life. God blesses you with a variety of people to encourage you and to build your faith. Yet, He does not desire that you exalt others over Him. It is His will that you depend first and foremost on Him.

Your Father wants you to know that you can run to Him. He longs for you to seek Him in all the circumstances of your life. This is crucial to intimacy with Him. If you run to others instead of seeking God, it will hinder your ability to grow in intimacy with Him. There is nothing wrong with talking with and depending on your spouse, family members, or fellow believers. Yet, the problem develops when you look to them first and depend on them more than on God. Your Father loves you. He desires that you cultivate the inclination to run to Him, especially in times of need.

The following verses reveal God's heart concerning this:

"The name of the Lord is a strong tower; the righteous run to it and are safe" (**Proverbs 18:10**).

"The LORD is my rock and my fortress and my deliverer" (2 Samuel 22:2).

"For You have been a shelter for me, a strong tower from the enemy" (**Psalm 61:3**).

"I will say of the LORD, 'He is my refuge and my fortress; My God, in Him I will trust" (**Psalm 91:2**).

Through these verses, God is saying to you that He will help you. He will bless you. You will find shelter in Him. Run to Him. Pray to Him. Trust in Him. How can you cultivate your inclination to run to Him as your Refuge?

- Rejoice in Him and praise Him as your Refuge. These verses reveal that your Father is a strong tower, a rock, a fortress, a deliverer, a shelter, and a refuge. Praise Him for being these things to you. Rejoice in these characteristics of God, especially in times of need.
- Confess your desire to run to Him. Tell Him that you want to find your refuge and shelter in Him. Declare your desire to trust Him above all others.
- Pray the preceding verses. You might consider developing Scripture prayers from the verses already mentioned. You can use these to plead for greater dependence on God. An example is "Father, Your name is like a strong tower. Your Word declares that the righteous can run to it and find safety. Father, help me to find refuge in You. I want to run to You. Teach me to depend on You when I am tired, discouraged, frustrated, or hurt. I long to know You and trust You first and foremost.

**B**mpower me to do this on a daily basis" (Proverbs 18:10).

Admit your struggle in this area. Tell your Father that you struggle to trust Him. Confess that you do turn to others before you turn to Him. Admit that you often try to take matters into your own hands rather than seeking Him.
